Petition

Adam Whybray kindly asks you to read and consider signing a petition from XR East Suffolk and Ipswich which is to be presented to Suffolk County Council. In light of Suffolk County Council declaring a 'Climate Emergency' the petition asks for the council to divest its pension funds from fossil fuel companies, abandon plans for an Ipswich Northern Bypass, invest in public transportation, protect Suffolk wildlife – ensuring new homes built in Suffolk are low-zero emission and restricting development that threatens to destroy precious remaining natural areas in the region, including Minsmere – and to create and be led by the decisions of a Citizen's Assembly on climate and ecological justice. Signing the petition can be done online and in no way otherwise indicates support for Extinction Rebellion, merely the terms of the petition alone. Thank you kindly.

In 2014 he celebrated 40 years as organist by giving a recital on 17th March. This led to our annual Spring Concerts.

Unitarians in East Anglia



What more could one wish on a sunny Sunday afternoon than a gathering of over fifty Unitarians, singing loudly, chatting away, discovering hidden history in a small market town...and having tea & coffee on tap along with a real chapel tea! And so it was, that the first gathering of Unitarians in East Anglia for over three years, arranged by the East Anglian Unitarian Women's Group (EAUWG) was a 'real do'.

It was really heartening to see so many from the Ipswich Congregation meeting with other Unitarians, as well as noting that every Unitarian chapel, church & meeting house in East Anglia had at least one person from their congregation in attendance. (the Colchester Group had their own summer gathering so unfortunately were unable to join with us)

The afternoon began with a short worship service led by the EAUWG, having as its theme 'Respecting and Caring for the Soil'. All the hymns, music and readings, with one exception, were by women. The roof just about held firm during the sing of 'Earth is Gift of God's Creation' and 'Come together in Love': the doors of the Framlingham Meeting House being open, I'm sure the pleasure of hearing the renditions must have been felt not only by the congregation but those walking past as well. Robert's organ voluntary of 'Blow up the Trumpet' by Rosalie Bonighton rounded the service off rousingly – if there's such a word! The collection raised £164 for the 'International Tree Foundation' (www.internationaltreefoundation.org).

About 20 people then joined Cliff for a guided walk

around the Unitarian history in Framlingham, taking in the Parish Churchyard wherein lies Samuel Say Toms, the town cemetery inhabited by Rev Thomas Cooper, campaigner against the slave trade, Rev John Goodwyn Barmby, christian socialist and many of the Framlingham Unitarians with whom we once gathered at the summer meetings held at the now demolished Bedfield Chapel.

Others, chose to remain at the Meeting House, cups of tea, chatting, meeting new people and catching up with old friends, until the 'walkers' arrived back...then it was a wonderful, delicious tea... I never knew vegan cakes could taste so good!

Our thanks must go to Rev Matthew Smith & the Framlingham congregation for the use of the Meeting House, Rev Cliff Reed for the guided walk and our organist Robert Waller, for the music. Last, but far from least, to Angela Hatt of Framlingham for the catering and my personal thanks to Brenda Smith for teaching me how to arrange sandwiches on a plate! Hopefully, a congregation or another individual group will think about arranging a similar gathering for next year.

Sugar Mouse Diabetes Appeal -Helping friends and family with diabetes

In 2015, our General Assembly passed a resolution on Testing On Animals (Resolution 4, 2015) to "advance non-animal medical research and in so doing help save human and animal lives." The following appeal comes from Rev Feargus O'Connor. Our current President, Rev. Celia Cartwright, Vicepresident, Anne Mills, and eleven former Presidents are among the 39 signatories.

"Animal Free Research UK has launched a major appeal to fund breakthrough research that has the potential to change millions of people's lives and help save our National Health Service billions of pounds every year. Animal Free Research UK researchers have recently made a hugely significant discovery which has the potential to transform the way we treat type 2 diabetes, a chronic condition currently present (either diagnosed or undiagnosed) in an estimated 5% of the UK population. As well as its effect on those with the condition type 2 diabetes – and the associated health issues like blindness, circulation problems and kidney failure – it has been estimated to cost the NHS £10 billion every year. The charity's 'Sugar Mouse Diabetes Appeal' is aimed at everyone who wants to see this lifelong and life changing condition beaten with world-class research – and delivered without any experiments on animals.

Professor Lorna Harries and Nicola Jeffery at the University of Exeter Medical School have been looking at the mechanisms

underlying type 2 diabetes. After discovering evidence that a proportion of the beta cells in the pancreas that produce insulin aren't dying but are changing into other types of cells Lorna and Nicola wanted to find out the reasons why the cells alter their identity in this way. But they've gone above and beyond this – and have discovered that this transformational process can be reversed, which could soon lead the way to treatments that will cure the condition. Lorna and Nicola have developed a new scientific methodology using human pancreatic beta cell lines, which have been grown in the laboratory without the use of any animals. This is cuttingedge research at its best – their exciting discoveries would never have been made if they had carried out conventional cruel experiments on mice as they are so different from humans. Not a single mouse has been killed during their research.

The charity urgently needs to raise £60,000 to provide funding for the first of a further three years of this ground-breaking research project, so Lorna and Nicola can take their discovery forward – and closer to a cure.
