Phil Chatfield will also continue as Property Manager throughout the project with his expert skills and knowledge of the building. We are grateful to them all for their extra commitment to our congregation and Meeting House.

We also thank Karen Tricker for preparing the Annual Report, Carol Gibbs for her work as Membership Secretary and Rosemary Hamilton for her support as Warden. We value everyone's support without which the Meeting House would struggle to exist.

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#### **Trustees Meeting**

At the AGM two Trustees (Paulette Reed and Linda King) stayed on the committee and three more Trustees were elected – Robert Waller. John Stevens and Tessa Forsdike. # **Supporting Charity**

For some time now our fundraising has concentrated on the Meeting House Restoration Fund with causes involving people taking a very definite second place. As we go in to 2021 it is time for us to be thinking about reversing this, to put people first.

Already for 2021 we have two ongoing fundraisers which have been a bit on hold; Sandra and Malcolm's traditional Christmas drinks and Cake raffle for the St Elizabeth Hospice, which will take place when we return to the Meeting House and the raising of a further £20 to twin our 3<sup>rd</sup> toilet...and the £63 needed to twin the 4<sup>th</sup> when it is 'up & flushing'.

In previous years we have also chosen one main charity annually for our support. The Trustees welcome your suggestions. Each of us may have our own 'favourite' charity and so we ask that you write a short paragraph about it, giving your reasons for your choice, which we will publish in the January newsletter. The congregation will then have the chance to vote after one of the January services to choose one and we can broaden our money raising from bricks and mortar (or wood, lathe and plaster!) to other areas.

# **Christmas Decorating**

It was 10 days after Halloween that the neighbours across the road put up their (sshhh) Christmas lights. The first on our road, and to date I haven't seen any others. Seeing those lights gave me the nudge to commit to paper this idea I've had and pose the question: what's atop your Christmas tree?

Over the years I have seen star, fairy, twisted ball of tinsel, angel, and even a cross. Our Christmas tree is decorated each year with a 'theme': minimalist, old, new, or colour. If the tree is of a particularly good shape then less is more. Another year the old decorations get an airing which include the little things the boys made at playgroup and primary school. Why throw them out if they are still useful and beautiful? It was William Morris who said "Have nothing in your



home that you do not know to be useful or believe to be beautiful". Well, those things are useful and beautiful and hold a lot of sentiment for me (unlike tinsel which has no place on any Christmas tree!) ## **Restoration Update**


Work on the restoration of the Meeting House is drawing to a close. The roof is now complete including some improvements to the lead gutters in the form of overflow pipes which will give early warning of leaf blockage or blockage by any other obstructions. The T-Pren gaskets installed in the 70's now have UV lead guards to minimise deterioration. Spare tiles will be left on site so that any repairs can be matched. See the photo below of roofing being completed at the ridge.

The external decoration of the building is also near completion and details of the special paints will be made available so that future decoration work is compatible. The Meeting House is looking great and all will be revealed when the scaffolding comes down at the beginning of December, after a final inspection by Historic England.

Once the scaffold has been dropped, preparations for lowering and relaying the forecourt can be made. This will give us level access to the Meeting House and prevent damp damage to the structure. This and the work to install a new toilet facility will take approximately six weeks so not being complete until mid-January 2021.

We can now look forward to a grand opening early next year.

## Societies Day on Zoom

On the 21<sup>st</sup> November it was a marathon stint on the computer to indulge myself in a day of learning about some of the groups & fellowships which meet under the umbrella of the General Assembly of Unitarian & Free Christian Churches. Details of all the groups taking part can be found on their websites.

It is said 'variety is the spice of life', and in this case there was a lot of 'variety' and 'spirit'. First up, 'Findhorn Unitarian Network' (FUN) and their presentation as to the ethos of the group and their times spent in community. Riena, one of our members is involved and I'm sure would be happy to discuss with anyone who may be interested. I was particularly interested in a game which was mentioned called 'Transformation Game' 'a fun and complex board game which offers a playful yet substantial way of understanding and transforming key issues in your life'. Please look it up on 'Google' and see whether you think this is something we can do in the congregation.

The Unitarian Renewal Group (URG) Looking at Unitarian Growth I found this most interesting and was impressed with the presentations by five of its members, all leaders of congregations with the exception of Stephen Lingwood who also has a pioneer ministry in Cardiff. Without going in to detail, there were many quotes in this session which I will share with you: Laura Dobson 'If God doesn't work for you, add an 'o' in the middle or an 's' on the end or whatever you conceive the mystery is' : Stephen Lingwood, 'so much of spiritual practice is getting out of our mind and into our body': Bridget Spain, 'we have lost our sense of purpose; we talk about a movement, not going to church or chapel...why do we have difficulty using the word God?' Ant Howe, 'find the common ground, the sweet spot...how can you define what is ultimately a mystery': and Christina Smith, 'growth, inclusiveness, questioning of historical

Earth Spirit Network (UESN) Introduced by Tony McNeile, who spoke of the Celtic seasons and the patterns of life. The presentation by Monica Strell, a nature based Interfaith Minister living in Assynt, Sutherland, a real far north wilderness outpost. Her talk & photos rekindled memories of the times my children and I spent at Sam Notcutt's cottage on the north coast of Sutherland! Unfortunately by this time, being in front of a screen for so long was exhausting and I failed to write down anything about the <u>Peace Fellowship</u> <u>& National Unitarian Fellowship(NUF)</u> and my recall, I'm sure, wouldn't give justice to the speakers from both groups. It was designed to be fluid - there was no agenda and the aim was to find out how different congregations were coping during the Corona Virus epidemic.

An attender at Norwich has a friend who is a sound engineer and together they are going to see how they can help with this problem and will share their findings. Yarmouth being a very small group have sent out service ideas for families to have services at home. Framlingham and Bury have given their Chalice a separate screen so that it is there for the whole service. I don't know how this works but it seems a nice idea. There was some discussion about activities that different congregations arrange during the week, also how newsletters were being distributed, again I commented on the work Tessa does on our monthly newsletter.
