Good news!!

We are so pleased to announce that work to restore our beautiful Meeting House will be starting in mid-February. We have raised enough money through donations, grants and our own fundraising efforts to be able to give the go ahead to our builders.

We have been awarded up to £421,000 from Historic England, £10,000 from Suffolk Historic Churches Trust, £5,000 from the Gregson Trust and together we have raised £20,000 with our own events and other fundraising sales and donations. There are two large grant applications still in the pipeline and we can only hope they are as generous. We also now aim to install a new toilet in the entrance lobby and to build proper disabled access at the front of the Meeting House as part of the last stages of the work. We do still have to raise more funds for these, so the hard work continues and Linda King and Tessa Forsdike are focussing on some more grant applications which will be ready to submit when details of costs and permissions are complete.

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Slightly Less Good News!

In order to allow the builders full access to do the extensive renovations, we will need to move out of the Meeting House after the service on Sunday 16th February. We will be holding our services in the Hall next door, which will be very different, but we are sure we will rise to the challenge and adapt well.

We are appealing for people to come and help at a Working Party on Saturday 15th February from 10am. We will need boxes to store books and papers (preferably ones with handles or grips holes). Most important is the availability of willing hands to help – or to make coffee for the workers. We can make it fun too.

We need to empty the outer pews, move the chairs and hymn books (so we can access them for services in the Hall), store all moveable items (children's toys etc.), clear under the stairs, pack all books and our Bits and Bobs items and generally tidy so that we do not hinder the builders in any way.

There will also be only limited parking available during the building work. There will be four spaces left available for people with a disability. During the week these will be used by people from Willis (for which they pay us). We can use them only on Sundays, so if you are able to park in a nearby car park and walk to the service in the Hall, that will leave more space for people who can't walk so far. Access round by the side of the Meeting House to the Hall will only be possible on Sundays. So we will need to be ready to work together.

Thanks go to Sandra and Malcolm for doing the organising and supplying the mince pies and to Linda King who raised £50 of that sum on the Bits and Bobs stall. In their comment piece below, Sandra and Malcolm wonder if it is time for a rethink ...?

The total of £ 115 is the lowest amount raised by this event over the 20 years or so that we have been organising this to support the local Hospice. We started the Mulled wine and mince pies event to raise money for the Hospice following a comment from our then minister the Rev Cliff Reed that with the carol service, Sunday service and then Christmas Day service so close together the Sunday service would be low on attendance. We suggested that having a social/fun event after the service might attract a larger congregation and also add to the Christmas atmosphere.

The idea was popular and we have continued each year since then. Sandra has made most of the mince pies (some are bought ones left over from the carol service) and we have provided the alcoholic and non-alcoholic mulled wine. I am afraid that we haven't kept a record of the amount we, the bits and bob stall and the draw for the Dundee cake have raised over the years. We have had help on the day from Phil and Ali and other members of the congregation.

- 2. How can we involve others?
- 3. Can we create a different fundraising event for the Hospice?
- 4. Should we abandon this event (although we are still happy to continue?

East Anglian Women's Group


