

The Stars are Brighter Here

Suffolk Pride are excited to support this play by Timothy Allsop based on oral testimony from interviews with LGBTQIA+ people from across the UK, including many from East Anglia. On a sitespecific journey through different parts of the museum, you will get to meet modern and historical characters and hear some of their stories and experiences. The historical elements are mostly drawn from work done by Pride in Suffolk's Past and Broken Futures. The play will take place in both indoor and outdoor settings. From nineteenth century archaeologists to Betty's nightclub, this play will show you that there has always been a queer presence in the countryside. Directly after the play, there will be a screening of a documentary film. Please note that some of the names have been changed and some elements adapted to protect the anonymity of some of our participants.

Show duration: Approx. 55 minutes Film Duration 10-12 minutes. Suitable for ages 13 and over. Audience numbers per show will be kept to about 25 people to help with social distancing.

House of One - Berlin

Jews, Christians and Muslims laid the foundation stone for the House of One on May 27, 2021, in the heart of the German capital Berlin. "This is an important step towards the structural completion of our interfaith peace project," Rabbi Andreas Nachama, chairman of the House of One Foundation Board, said Tuesday. "We have already been active in interfaith dialogue for many years, and contribute in our daily work to more understanding, tolerance and togetherness in our society." It is therefore all the more gratifying to soon be able to accompany the erection of this built symbol of that work of understanding.



The House of One will be built on the historic foundations of the former St. Peter's Church. The church, which was damaged in World War II, was completely demolished in GDR times.
