Report on the Unitarian General Assembly Meeting 2022

Gratitude and transformation were the two themes that stood out for me at the GA meeting in Birmingham. Gratitude first of all, to the Trustees for allowing me, as your delegate, to spend two whole days with an amazing group of fellow Unitarians. Gratitude for the opportunity to come together again after Covid was also expressed in the Opening Service. Covid has forced congregations to think of ways to keep connected which has resulted in innovative services attracting often more than the usual attenders to their zoom meetings. We have shown that we are able to adapt and now have an opportunity to transform our experiences into even stronger intentions and actions for the future.

With these encouraging words in our ears the plenary business sessions started, skilfully led by our President and Chair Ann Mills. The Motions were discussed at length but also to a very strict time schedule and four out of the four motions we had discussed the week before were carried. This means that our vote against the logo-investigation-motion did not prevent the motion from being carried. People felt very strongly that the congregations should have been consulted - like we did - and wished to find out what the reason for nonconsultations had been and a possible return to the old logo - unlike us. It was made clear that the new logo will be used by Essex Hall but that individual congregations can keep their logo if they wish to do SO.

The NHS anti-privatisation motion was passed and very moving speeches were made in favour of the transgender right to self-declare their own gender. This motion was passed too. The motion for the 'We the People Campaign', arguing for a bottoms-up democracy and more say for indigenous people in the UN was passed too, though it needs to be worked out further. The days are well organised and there is hardly a free moment apart from the coffee and tea breaks and of course lunch and dinner, where you can join any table and meet Unitarians from all over Britain and other countries. Having been previously to the GA, I am always amazed how easy it is to start a conversation and even begin a

friendship with your neighbour at the table. It must be because we have so much in common on a deeper level.

I went to several workshops and learned a great deal. The workshop I found most inspiring was led by the UUA Minister for Worship Erika Hewitt. She led us through a service with the help of Google Earth and space exploration pictures allowing us to experience the wholeness of the cosmos and our place in it, connected to everything. She also engaged us in learning a song and had us talking to each other after questions she posed. There were words, pictures, music and participation. She used this service to help those who take services to ask themselves: What makes you story/service spiritual; How does your message engage your relationship with the Universal Spirit/with that which is larger than us; What transformation is embedded in your story; How does your story embody hope; How does your story invite people to a new engagement with others, the world and with that which is larger than us? I felt spiritually uplifted by this engaging service. Her modern, deeply spiritual approach to services had also impressed Cliff and he encouraged me to buy her book 'The Shared Pulpit' for our Meeting House. This, together with another publication called 'Why Are We Here?' will be on our bookshelf and can be borrowed. There was much more of course: the rousing address by the Welsh minister Wyn Thomas in the Anniversary Service, the interesting Keynote Lecture and workshop by Indra Adnan about the "Politics of Waking-Up; Power and Possibility in the Fractal Age" in which she talked about inner transformation that is essential in the work

to tackle the crises of our time. Her lecture will no doubt be published in The Inquirer. Overall I was impressed by the spiritual depth of the meetings this year and feel enriched by my attendance. Riena Jackson

Code of ethics: an invitation to contribute from the Findhorn Unitarian Network and Executive Committee

At the 2021 General Assembly AGM, a resolution was passed that requested the GA Executive Committee to consult widely and to prepare a Unitarian Code of Ethics. The initial step in the process is for the GA Executive Committee to 'call for submissions from member congregations, affiliated societies, districts, Ministers, Lay Leaders and others employed or engaged in the Unitarian movement'.

To this end we invite you to complete a questionnaire which also includes a request for any documents in use to be made available. It is hoped that this work will be a resource for all Unitarians in the UK and is a way to articulate our core principles. It is therefore vital to incorporate the perspectives and experience of as many of you as is possible.

Responses are invited from both individuals and from committees representing Unitarian congregations, Districts, and Societies as well as from those employed in a Unitarian post.

Please respond to the survey from the perspective of your Unitarian experience. The GA Executive Committee has delegated the collation of responses to a working party. Responses will be held in confidence.
