Ipswich Outreach



Ipswich Outreach includes Ipswich Soup Kitchen that was formed by Central Churches together in 1992 and has been running every night of the week since then. We also have a bus for outreach work and work with over 30 local agencies including IBC. We have an NHS Team that comes out with us as well. We see 30 to 50 people each night at the Soup Kitchen in Elm Street with many problems such as homelessness, mental health, hardship and loneliness.

In addition the Soup Kitchen works with many other local organisations that can offer the support that we cannot. We have an NHS health Outreach Team that comes down twice a week and The Samaritans twice a month.

The volunteer army that makes all this possible is now 200+ strong and growing. These are folk from all walks of life that give up an evening every fortnight.

We need blankets, sleeping bags and toiletries for the Soup Kitchen and welcome donations of clothes, bric-a-brac, small furniture and small electrical items to sell in our shop.
