National Churches Trust

We have more good news about funding for our Restoration Project – we are grateful to the National Churches Trust who have given us a cornerstone grant. **Broadcaster and journalist Huw Edwards, Vice President of The National Churches Trust, said:**

"The UK's historic churches and chapels are a vital part of our national heritage. But to survive, many need to carry out urgent repairs and install modern facilities. The cost of this work is far beyond what most congregations can pay for themselves."

It was built in 1700 and the fittings and interior details are almost all original. Meeting House Update 20th August 2020

I visited the site on Thursday 20th August to make my usual two weekly inspections and can report excellent progress is being made. Glenn is now making the visits in between mine.

All four walls have received the first coat of render, called a scratch coat or pricking up coat, and this first layer is curing very well with very little shrinkage cracking (see photo). This first coat is scratched to help provide a good bond with the second coat. This was also inspected by Cooks and they confirmed that all the walls will be ready for the second coat from the 1st September saving some programme time. The topcoat will closely follow the second coat to ensure full bonding, with the render work being completed hopefully by end of September.



The recovering of the roof has started in earnest to the point where the south elevation has been under felted and battened ready to receive the new tiles (see photo – opposite). The good news is that the roof structure is in good shape and no repairs have been needed to this first slope. If this is the case on all slopes then some funding can be channelled towards the lowering of the paved areas in front of the building. The roofers confirmed my opinion that the old tiles are not reusable. The roof insulation to a total thickness of 300mm will be laid as the roof replacement progresses. Safe walkways are also being installed in the roof spaces over the insulation, to give access for lowering the lights and servicing the fire



alarm system. The roof voids are to be fire compartmented to minimise the spread of fire in the roof spaces.

We have noted some small repairs are necessary to one of the high level windows on the front and Mark has this in hand. This work and the walkways will be completed by Mark and Peter which, along with any roof repairs, will be the last of the carpentry work on site.

KLH and I are going to review the front paved areas at my next visit and we will have a cost review with our surveyor, Kevin from Castons, following the next valuation towards the end of September. At present there is every indication that all the work currently scheduled will be covered, with just the toilet facility still to be funded. With a fair wind the Christmas service will be our opening.

GOSPELS, GNOSTICS AND THE GROWTH OF THE EARLY CHURCH

At the time of writing Cliff has led us through three Zoom sessions on the early church, with two still to come. I am so glad I raised the possibility of this course with him, which he agreed to offer if there were sufficient interest. With 23 participants signing up, there was no doubt that there was, and I think we have all been fascinated by what we have heard so far, though it may have been perhaps slightly unnerving to discover that what most of us probably assumed from our school R.E. lessons and from exposure to traditional church or chapel services was "gospel" was not the only version – I gather from our session vesterday that there were at least 30 forms of Christianity in existence in the early centuries A.D!

Cliff has clearly gone to great lengths in his presentation of the course, sending out notes in advance and promising us a final handout at the end which, since each hour's session on a Tuesday has presented us with such a wealth of information, will offer a welcome opportunity to revisit the material. Instead of accepting the offer of a fee for participation in the course, Cliff has generously suggested that we make a donation to the Meeting House Restoration Fund.
