Ipswich's Historic Churches – Hidden Stories – Friday 8th September at 19.00

John Field will talk about Ipswich's 12 mediaeval churches, with their monuments, parish records and long histories provide a sort of 3D archive of life in the town over many centuries. This talk explores a number of incidents, points of interest, hidden features and personal stories not immediately apparent in a cursory visit which help to bring the town's Mediaeval churches to life and throws a light on life in our town over many years.

Suffolk Historic Churches Trust Ride and Stride 2023.

Ipswich Dissenters – Thursday 14th September from 10.00 to 12 noon

John Warren has an interest in the history of Ipswich and in this talk will share information about the Protestant Dissenters in our historic Dissenters Meeting House.

Henry VIII's excommunication in 1538 allowed him some independence from European neighbours, as well as other options in his search for a male heir. For subsequent Tudors, the consequences were a serious threat to both the nation and the rulers' survival. Catholics, backed by European powers, struggled with protestant nationalists until a definition of a Church of England slowly evolved. This all had a profound effect on Ipswich, (including migration to the New World), before, during and after the bloodbath of the Civil War. How the Unitarians fit into this history is discussed.

On 25th July 2023 Ruth Leigh visited the Meeting House and gave us an amusing insight into herself and work as a Writer and Author. I bought two of her books and am hooked even to the point of slowing down my reading as I was nearing the end and didn't want it to finish. I will now have to buy the next two on Isabella M Smugge.

Ruth has spent the last fifteen years writing for other people. Her portfolio includes a radio station, several Christian charities, an estate agent, a florist and a trainer. During lockdown, 75% of her work disappeared overnight and she found she had time on her hands. Writing for a national blog in April 2020, she decided to make up a woman who was the exact opposite of herself. Rich, posh, skinny and eye-wateringly successful, Isabella M Smugge (as in Bruges) is a

Starry 'Instamum' with millions of followers on Instagram and Tik Tok, a vast swathe of successful books to her name with every trend and fashion within reach of her perfectly manicured fingertips.

She was only ever meant to be a two-dimensional joke character, but she was spotted by an agent who pitched the idea around various publishers in the Summer of 2020. Isabella found a home with small, independent award-winning publisher Instant Apostle and her adventures have proved to be extremely popular with readers.

Self-obsessed, snobbish and with virtually no self-awareness, Isabella leaves London for Suffolk with her husband, three children and Latvian au pair in tow. Nothing works out as she'd imagined, and our heroine starts to question everything she always believed to be true.



Ruth writes in a funny style, with lots of jokes but with heart. Her freelance writing background, particularly in the field of estate agency, has furnished her with enough knowledge of Farrow and Ball paint colours, kitchen trends and garden design to create Isabella's gorgeous world.

There is nothing she loves more than talking about writing, comedy, literature and all that goes with it.

They give them the skills and tools they need to rebuild their futures, manage their trauma and help them move from victim to survivor.

Child sexual abuse is very prevalent, 1 in 10 children will be a victim and we must all take action in order to keep children safe.

Patsy Johnson Cisse Managing Director for Brave Futures explains the importance of being the Mayor's Charity "We are delighted to be chosen as one of the Mayor's charities this year. With an increase in referrals and a higher demand on the service, fundraising is essential to ensure that every child has access to this life saving support. This August marks fifty years since her death in 1973, and in many ways the legacy of her work for the people and churches of the Khasi Hills in India lives on today. My target is one hundred days, because the President of Ipswich Rotary Club set members a task, undertake 100 tasks in this, the 100th anniversary year of the club. You will appreciate that having cycled almost every day for the past 70 years this may not be the challenge it seems. I am told however, that the effects of chemotherapy and other drugs will bring my active days to an end sooner than I would like. All contributions to my fund raising page

WhatsApp Scam

Large community and religious WhatsApp groups are being targeted by scammers who infiltrate them to try and deceive their members into sending them money. Since January of this year, 268 people have reported falling victim to this scam – reports Action Fraud.

What can you do to avoid being a victim?

- **Never** share your account's two-factor authentication (2FA) code (that's the six digit code you receive via SMS).
- **Set up two-step verification** to give an extra layer of protection to your account. Tap Settings > account >Two-step verification > Enable.
- **THINK. CALL**. If a family member or friend makes an unusual request on WhatsApp, always call the person to confirm their identity.
- · You can **report spam messages or block a sender within WhatsApp**. Press and hold on the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions.
