## **Five Celebrations**



During the Christmas holidays I learned of another cultural festival which was completely new to me. I was semi familiar with Jewish, Muslim and Hindu festivals which hold a similar importance for believers in those faiths as Christmas does for Christians.

My granddaughter's Montessori Nursery held a celebration with songs and dances at Christmas time and the programme made a point of wishing us all a happy holiday, whether Christmas, Hanukkah, Diwali, Ramadan or Kwanzaa ... and a happy new year to make sure they covered all options.

As I had never heard of the Kwanzaa celebration, I had to check on Google. It told me (via Wikipedia) that it is an annual celebration of African American culture which takes place from December 26 to January 1, culminating in a communal feast called Karamu usually on the sixth day. It was created by activist Maulana Karenga, a Black nationalist and professor of Pan-African studies at California State University at Long Beach. It is based on African harvest festival traditions from various parts of Africa, including West and Southeast Africa. Kwanzaa was first celebrated in 1966, which is a long time not to have heard of it.

It seems that the non-religious festival grew out of the political and Black Power struggles in the 1960s and 70s. It is based on African first fruits traditions of giving the first produce to the Gods. The name Kwanzaa is from Swahili *matunda ya kwanza*. The rituals of the holiday promote *Nguzo Saba*, the "*seven principles of African Heritage*" that Karenga described as "*a communitarian African philosophy*". Each day is celebrated to mark one of the principles and a candle is lit on the seven branched candelabra.

The principles are -

- <u>Umoja (unity)</u>—To strive for and maintain unity in the family, community, nation, and race.
- <u>Kujichagulia (self-determination)</u>To define ourselves, name ourselves, create for ourselves, and speak for ourselves.
- <u>Ujima (collective work and responsibility)</u>— To build and maintain our community together and make our brothers' and sisters' problems our problems and to solve them together.
- <u>Ujamaa (cooperative economics)</u>—To build and maintain our own stores, shops, and other businesses and to profit from them together.
- <u>Nia (purpose)</u>—To make our collective vocation the building and development of our community in order to restore our people to their traditional greatness.
- <u>Kuumba (creativity)</u>To do always as much as we can, in the way we can, in order to leave our community more beautiful and beneficial than we inherited it.
- <u>Imani (faith)</u>—To believe with all our heart in our people, our parents, our teachers, our leaders, and the righteousness and victory of our struggle.

Whatever our faith tradition (or none), these principles seem universal.

#### Five Celebrations (cont.)

As I delved further, I discovered there are some disputes about Maulana Karenga's criminal record (he is currently on parole) as to whether his charge was due to political pressures and the rivalry between his organisation US magazine and the Black Panthers. This, whether true or not, does not detract from the ideas behind Kwanzaa.

I do not know of anyone in the UK who celebrates this festival and would be interested to hear how familiar with it readers are.

#### Volunteering for TWAM

I became aware of TWAM after I retired and was in a position to give some time to what I thought was a very worthwhile cause. TWAM is an acronym for Tools With a Mission and the idea is to refurbish no longer wanted items for use in Africa. TWAM will take any hand tools, spanners, manual or electric sewing machines, knitting machines, books and computers. They are sorted, cleaned and repaired and the electrical items are PAT tested before they are sent off in a shipping container to various countries in Africa.

For as long as I can remember I have always taken things apart and had a go at repairing them so it was ideal for me when I was set to work on refurbishing sewing machines. Most of the time a good clean and lubrication will get a machine running as good as new but occasionally more complex problems do arise. Usually with a bit of thought and application the vast majority of machines can be made to run and sew as new. Any machines that are beyond repair are stripped of the good parts leaving us with a good supply of used components which we can use to bring machines up to scratch. Some of the manual machines are over one hundred years old and after they have been serviced they will probably be good for another century of use.

It feels good to be part of something that can make a real difference to people's lives. A sewing machine will give both men and women an alternative way of earning a living and supporting their family.
