We have received two more awards in recognition of the quality of our restoration project for the Meeting House.

We also received an award from RIBA which was accepted by Stuart Edgar (architect) and Adrian Valiant (from F.A. Valiant & Son Ltd – our main contractors for the work). The award was in the restoration category of the RIBA Suffolk Craftsmanship Awards and is evidence of the quality and attention to detail of the work done on our Meeting House – thanks to all who shared their expertise and knowledge.

The invitation to Sibton Park Orangery courtesy of Mr and Mrs Jon Hunt recently was a welcome one. Robert Waller and I made our way via the beautiful Suffolk Countryside to this equally beautiful setting. We did not have much time to enjoy the scenery because as we neared our destination there was a long queue of traffic, which made us think we were going to be late. The cause of the hold up? Two adult swans with cygnets being herded towards where we were heading. It turned out that several of the cars in the queue were guests going to the same place as us.

We listened to Sir Laurie Magnus CBE, Chair of Historic England, talk on "The Power of Heritage to Transform Places and Improve Lives". Big ones, tiny ones; local and national, structures and open spaces. We have it in our power to make sure these places are preserved and used.

Robert Waller and I went as representatives of the Meeting House to receive another certificate. This time from the Suffolk Preservation Society. It is in recognition of the outstanding restoration work carried out over the last eighteen months.

*Suffolk Pride is a non-profit organization that hosts the LGBTQ+ Pride Festival in Ipswich, Suffolk annually. Alongside this, they work with the community year-round to promote diversity, community, acceptance and inclusion.

There will also be a Pride service at the Meeting House on Sunday 19th June led by Lynn Davies from the Octagon in Norwich.

Lighthouse Care Packs

As part of our support for Lighthouse, we prepare packs for women and children as an emergency support for when, because of the danger from domestic abuse and violence, they have left their homes at short notice, often without anything except what they stand up in. The basic contents of each pack for women contains shampoo; shower gel; hair conditioner; toothpaste; toothbrush; notebook; pen; sanitary towels; novel; deodorant; hand sanitiser, tissues and often hand cream. We like to add other items such as hairbrush and emery board when we can.

We prepare two types of packs for children – for ages 2 to 6 and ages 6 to 10. Each has toothbrush, drawing paper; colouring pens or crayons; story book; toy and anything else suitable such as a pot of bubbles to play with. Occasionally we also make up a pack for female teenagers, although fewer teenage children end up in the refuge.

The funds raised by the Organ Recital and Poetry Launch will go towards buying the essential items for the packs as well as a direct donation of funds to Lighthouse.

Sometimes people have asked about donating items for the packs. We have some wonderful support from Paula Chapman who makes the beautiful drawstring bags to put everything in. If you would like to buy items, the most helpful would be to buy the special items we need –

- Hand cream
- Emery boards
- Hairbrushes
- Children's toys (safe ones)
- Felt tip pens
- Thick crayons

Please pass these to Tessa Forsdike or leave them at the Meeting House. Alternatively you can make a financial donation to help fund the standard items. We suggest a financial donation so that we can buy all the items for a whole pack rather than having some of them and not being able to make up a full pack. Thank you.

A Meeting House Nightmare

I had found myself in hell! Disaster and trial had followed one another incessantly. My wife, baby son and I had just got to the underground shelter complex when the first nuclear bombs burst. In the year 2077 I had invested all to provide us with suspended animation to see us through the inevitable nuclear holocaust to a time when it would be safe, and the investment had appeared our only chance. But then, after apparently no time, I awakened to see my wife brutally murdered and my son taken away by people in hazard protection clothing... then I was fully awake and had exited the sheltering vault to a ruined still radio-active world peopled by monstrosities, murdering raiders and fascist mercenary troops and then all I could do was just survive.

I had made my way into the skeleton ruin of Boston and had followed a trail to the Old North Church, still remarkably intact. I had to fight my way through the feral ghouls, humans who had become so irradiated and changed so as to lose all humanity and had developed a lust for animal protein of any kind and was able to enter the church... and then further shocks... for I was confronted with a memory from another life and a sight that surpassed all other nightmares!

Well, perhaps a little overwrought! Last year Mrs Gray presented me with a Virtual Reality Headset for my birthday and my eldest son a copy of the game 'Fallout 4 VR'. For those who are not computer gamers, a virtual reality headset puts you into a full three-dimensional world in which you can move around and interact with your environment in quite incredible detail. It can be quite daunting to begin with but you soon learn how to manage your world. The game, 'Fallout 4' is part of a franchise set in a post atomic war USA with a complex story but from a kind of alternative world modelling on the 1950s 'atomic' culture when people used to go to Las Vegas to watch the nuclear testing for fun and following on with a culture not unlike 'The Jetsons' TV animated series. There is a surprising amount of quite subtle satire about the American way of life including enough weaponry to equip an army! A devastated USA set around the Boston area is shown in horrific detail. Overall, the experience is rather like actually participating in a long novel. Apart from the shoot'em ups, there is positive side in which you can gather the lost and help to build working communities.



My great shock upon entering Old North Church was that it was uncannily like a devasted and burned Ipswich Meeting House, something that genuinely shook me at the time. Although there are obvious differences the similarity was shocking. Make your own mind up with the screenshots taken from the game!

On a more relaxed level and of Unitarian interest, I would like to recommend 'WALDEN a game' based on Henry David Thoreau's year spent living by Walden Pond (that incidentally is also a destination in 'Fallout 4' in a rather different context). It has rather beautiful graphics and the object of the game is to manage your environment to enable your stay, at the same time learning much about the man and his life. Character such as Ralph Waldo Emmerson are included. Overall, a pleasant way to spend several evenings. The game is available from 'Steam', probably the largest provider of games on the internet at £7.19 for the download, unfortunately PC only.


Book Group and Poetry Group
