Report on the Unitarian General Assembly Meeting- 16th to 18th April 2019

The Assembly took place at the Birmingham Hotel Metropole (a large well appointed hotel) starting at 2pm on Tuesday and finishing at 1.45pm on Thursday.

Events went on to 9.15 pm on Tuesday and Wednesday and started at 7.30am on Wednesday and Thursday. You could be very busy if you wished to attend as many meetings as possible! There were seven events to which all of the 360 delegates should/could attend.

There were 14 motions put to the full assembly. This year none of them was controversial. All of them were approved by a show of hands (you held up your voting card at the appropriate time to support, oppose or abstain from voting).

13 of the motions dealt with –

- a. The appointment of individuals to positions of authority for the year 2019 – 2020
- b. The approval of the appointment of the firm of auditors for 2019 – 2020
- c. Thanks to people for their work in the 2018-2019 year or a longer period and the approval of the Report of the General Assembly Executive Committee for 2018 – 2019.
- d. Motion 8 *'that greetings be sent to kindred churches and societies abroad'*
- e. Motion 12 appointed Rev Celia Cartwright as President of the General Assembly of Unitarian and Free Christian Churches for the year 2019 – 2020
- f. Motion 14 thanked Joan Cook for being President for the year 2018 – 2019

There remains Motion 1 which (in my opinion) is the most important matter that was brought up at the GA meeting for this year. It concerns knife crime – the precise wording of this motion as approved is at the end of this report. Attendees were asked to write or otherwise contact their MP to ask them to support Government action along the lines of this motion. I will be writing to my MP. I wonder how many MPs we can cover between us – it might just be enough to get something done!?

The programme for the Assembly, (apart from the seven sections referred to above) is divided into nine one hour sections with three events going on at once for each section. Many of these subsections are either not of interest to 'ordinary' delegates i.e. Penal and Social Affairs; Welsh Department (in Welsh); and Minister's Pension Fund were all on in the same one hour time slot. I went to an hour on each of – Peace Fellowship; Lindsey Press and Psychical Society. I was interested to hear what would be said in the Psychical Society, but I came out with an 'empty' feeling. I wonder why or how I would ever go to a service!

There were only two or three people at the Assembly (other than the three other Ipswich delegates) who I knew, but we were all wearing name tags with our name and the name of our congregation printed on each side of the tag and everybody was easy to talk to.

I understand that the GA will be at the same place next year. The food was good and with self service for breakfast and lunch we were in good time for our pm meetings. BUT the waiter service for the two evening meals was poor, which meant that the two one hour evening events (JRB Keynote Lecture on Tuesday and Anniversary Service on Wednesday) started late.

Motion 1 passed as resolution 7

The General Assembly of Unitarian and Free Churches :

Expresses its concern at the increasing incidence of devastating knife crime in Britain's towns and cities.

Report on the GA meeting – cont.

Expresses its strong support for an adequately funded multi agency campaign to tackle this significantly raised threat to public safety, along the lines of that which has been so successful in Glasgow.

Urges Her Majesty's Government and the devolved administrations to establish an immediate investigation into ways and means of drastically reducing, over time, the ready availability of sharp pointed knives by the introduction of appropriate controls on retail and internet sales.

Calls upon Unitarian congregations to publicise the resolution amongst their members and friends and to ask their local elected representatives to raise these concerns with their relative Ministers and the Home Secretary's Serious Violence Task Force, with particular regard to the issue of sharp pointed knives.

Ginkgo Biloba Tree

Two members of our congregation remember Professor Cooke whose memorial tree was released from its metal grill to 'breathe' again recently -

Long years ago before PR appeared on the Meeting House scene, I wrote to Willis as the tree men they paid to cut the churchyard trees were unaware of the rarity of the Ginkgo Biloba: the sacred tree from the Far East and were shaping it up as if it were an English specimen. Willis replied appreciatively and said they'd pass on the message. Probably the Ginkgo Biloba's rarity is not being passed on again.

I am probably the only person in this time who has actually met Professor Cooke whose remains lie under this tree in our cemetery. He was an American Unitarian who usually joined us in August when he visited a relative south of Suffolk. I remember him as a man: small, quietly spoken and clearly unwell as he usually dined with Rev Nick Teape and me at the manse. When he preached his whole personality changed and he was exceptionally clear and inspiring. He asked that if he died on one of these holiday visits, his ashes might be placed in the cemetery under this rare sacred tree from the East. This was done. Maybe the present Trustees can retrieve the metallic details of his resting place and put them where they can be read.
