Forum of Faiths

On Friday 15th November Ann Baeppler and I attended a Forum of Faiths organised by the "Faith & Spirituality Network Suffolk" and were there to represent our Unitarian community. Some 25 people were present, with the local Anglican, Hindu, Buddhist, Jewish, Latter Day Saints, Quaker, Roman Catholic and Sikh communities being represented. Cynthia Capey, the driving force behind the Interfaith initiative many years ago, started by taking a look at the early aspirations and experiences of interfaith pioneers in Suffolk and went on to take stock of how things stand today. No firm conclusions were reached about the way forward, but the general consensus was to hold further meetings and to let activities evolve. At a time when many parts of the world are troubled by armed conflict, it is important for the different strands of our society to know and understand each other and to gain a better insight into the faiths underlying their thoughts and actions. Sarah Adams has taken over the chairmanship of FSNS from Cynthia, who has now fully earned a quiet retirement.

The Meeting House when Rev Cliff Reed was Minister has played an important role in the past by hosting the first annual interfaith services (a role which was acknowledged and celebrated). As part of the inaugural Inter Faith Week in 2009, a special national event was attended by Faith Community Leaders who signed a statement acknowledging the value of and representing their commitment to inter faith work. The statement is well worth quoting and may help strengthen a revived intention to work at a better understanding between people of all faiths and none.

"We believe that good inter faith relations are a vital part of a harmonious, just and respectful society.

We pledge today, to deepen our work to increase understanding about and between our faiths and

to strengthen our cooperation on social issues.

We renew our commitment to developing effective and long term ways of dialogue and mutual learning. We shall continue to seek to understand the patterns of engagement of our faith communities – through history and today; to affirm the positive aspects of these patterns; and to heal wounds of misunderstanding where these are found.

While our great religious traditions are distinct in belief and practice, there is much that unites us. We will draw on fundamental values held in common and on the wisdom of our respective faith traditions to continue to work — as individual communities together — for the wellbeing of our society, our wider global community and the planet that is our home.

Alongside all of good will, we will work to tackle with renewed determination the challenges of poverty, ignorance, injustice, crime and violence, and social fragmentation and to help shape a society where all feel at home; all are valued and justly treated; and all have a chance to thrive."

Meaning of the Advent Ring

<u>Holly</u> – is said to heal certain ailments and in some countries is known as Christ's thorn. The berries are thought to represent the drops of blood which fell from Jesus' crown of thorns at the time of the crucifixion.

<u>Rosemary</u> - is a symbol of friendship and remembrance, thus used at Christmas when we remember the birth of Jesus.

<u>Mistletoe</u> - is a symbol of fertility, which is probably the origin of the traditional kissing beneath the mistletoe and is said to offer protection from evil spirits.

<u>Bay and Laurel</u> are symbols of victory and honour and were used in ancient Rome to decorate the wreaths worn by heroes, emperors or athletes. <u>Ivy</u> is associated with Bacchus, the god of revelry, representing happiness and good cheer. <u>Yew</u> is said to offer protection against witches. *Thanks to Rosemary Hamilton for this contribution.*
