### **Heritage Open Days**

Weekend of 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> September – as part of the national Heritage Open Days, an Art Trail starting at the Meeting House with art in various media displayed inside the building and outside in a marquee in the courtyard and continuing through the town. Free entry. There will also be a chance to try your own hand at a creative activity. Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> from 9am to 5pm, Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> – the marquee will be open from 10am to 4pm and the Meeting House will be open for the usual service starting at 10.45 and then for the art display from 12 noon to 4pm.

As part of the heritage week, we will also offer two special talks linked to the theme of architecture –

<u>Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> September 7pm (19.00)</u> – as part of the Heritage Open Days week – a talk by stone conservator Antonia Hockton – **Stone Conservation** – **what happens behind the scenes** 

Antonia Hockton will give a talk on stone conservation and restoration. For over 30 years she has quietly worked behind the scenes, to keep our heritage buildings and monuments going. Initially training at Lincoln Cathedral, her skills have taken her to heritage sites all around this country and France. Patience and a head for heights are essential, but what else does the job entail? Find out by coming to the Unitarian Meeting House to listen to Antonia's talk and to ask her questions. Free entry – donations welcome to the Meeting House on the night.
